What is human trafficking?

A person who makes money through buying or selling humans for sex, sex exploitation, labor, or organ removal. The trafficker will use promises of a better life, shame, drugs, threats, blackmail, love, or any emotional trick to control and keep a person in slavery.

Sex exploitation occurs when a person is sexually abused or violated in exchange for anything of value such as money, power, or status. Trafficking occurs when a third party such as a pimp profits from the act.


Examples of exploitation are sex for profit, pornography, exotic dancing, making and or distributing nude pictures or videos, and sexting (texting of pictures or videos).



- The average ages for child sex slavery is 11-14.
 Tragically children as young as age 2 are exploited.
 On any given night, it's estimated that 200+ children are for sale in Dallas, Texas.
- Women and girls most significantly represent the slave population but men and boys are victims too.
- Trafficking occurs in the city, suburban areas, small towns, and in the country / rural areas. There are no boundaries.

- This horrific crime preys on vulnerability.
- Traffickers look for the vulnerable in malls, fast food places, supercenters, parks, schools, public transportation, kid hang outs, social media sites.
- Traffickers use social media apps to locate, befriend, groom, lure and sell their victims.
- Traffickers create a false sense of trust. IF it sounds too good to be true, IT IS!
- All of us are at risk when we become vulnerable. Insecurities, arguments, trauma, isolation, break ups are life events that create vulnerability. As a result we don't always make the best choices.
- A sense of security and safety is key when dealing with vulnerability.
- **NOTHING** is as important to your child's safety than open dialogue with you.
- Be understanding. Most victims don't speak up because they feel guilt or shame and/or fear that no one will believe their story.

- 3rd party controls the persons schedule & social interaction
- Personal I.D. in the hands of some one else
- May have a language speaking barrier
- · Isolation from community, family or friends
- · New company of friends and / or hangouts
- Luxury items like manicures, designer clothing, purses, etc. without an explainable source of income or not reflective of them
- Evidence of violence: bruising, swelling, scaring
- Tattoos not normal to the person's character; branding like 'daddy', 'cash', or '\$'
- Sexual clothing that's inappropriate for the situation or weather
- Frequent moves / unstable schedule
- Lack of knowledge about the community
- Malnutrition, dehydration, exhaustion
- Sexual pictures on their phone (sexting) or social media
- · Multiple phones or social media accounts
- Hotel key cards or refillable gift cards



- The life / the game = The commercial sexual exploitation or the sex industry
- Bottom girl = the head girl for the trafficker
- Daddy = the trafficker or pimp
- Dates / Johns / Tricks / Buyers = Buyers of sex
- Folks / Family = A reference to loyal associates of the pimp including victims and others who work for the him/her
- Ho = The slang name given to the victim
- Ho Line = A loose network of communications between pimps, chiefly by phone, used to trade, buy and sell victims
- Kidde Stroll = An area for trafficked children under 16, often much younger
- Out of Pocket = to look or talk to another pimp
- Seasoned girl = the person working below the 'bottom girl' in the family / stable / organization
- Squad = crew; posse, gang = an informal group of individuals with a common identity and a sense of solidarity.
- Square Up = To get out of the game
- Stable = A group of victims under the control of the trafficker / pimp
- Survival Sex = when a person trades sex in exchange for basic needs
- Track / Stroll = A street location for commercial sex
- To turn out = When a pimp sends a person out on his/her first night as a ho
- Wifee/ Wife-in-law = person who works for the same trafficker / pimp



- Changes in their school attendance, habits, appearance, socioeconomics, friend groups, interests, school activities or lack of, vocabulary, demeanor, attitude and sexual behavior / clothing
- Luxury items like manicures, designer clothing, purses, etc. without an explainable source of income
- Missing school; truancy; multiple run away
- Getting into trouble in the company of older teens or adults
- Claim of an older boyfriend / girlfriend
- Tattoos not normal to the person's character / family; branding like 'daddy', 'cash', or '\$'
- Hotel key cards or refillable gift cards
- Multiple phones or social media accounts; lying about the existence of those accounts and/or refusing parent access to them
- Sexual pictures on their phone (sexting) or social media
- Unexplained injuries: bruising, swelling, redness, cigarette burns
- Malnutrition, dehydration, exhaustion
- Chronic infections
